Alan Wyatt Promoted as Police Chief

Weaverville's Town Manager Selena Coffey has announced that former detective and Assistant Police Chief Alan Wyatt has been promoted to Police Chief for the Town of Weaverville. Wyatt, who has worked for retiring Police Chief Greg Stephens for 15 years in progressively responsible positions of Officer, Sergeant, Detective and most recently as Assistant Chief, will take the reins of the Department upon the retirement of Chief Stephens on January 2, 2018.

"I am confident that incoming Chief Wyatt will lead the Weaverville Police Department in a professional manner and he and his officers will continue to provide Weaverville with a police department to be proud of," Town Manager Coffey stated. "I look forward to working with him in his new capacity as Chief and I am very happy that we were able to promote from within our top-notch Department for this important position."

Wyatt is a Veteran of the United States Air Force where he served 10 years as a Security Specialist and Mobility Officer. His experience also includes serving as a Police Officer for the Mars Hill Police



Department and the Mars Hill College Security. Wyatt holds a Criminal Justice Education Training and Standards Commission Advanced Law Enforcement Certificate and a North Carolina Justice Academy Criminal Investigator Program Certificate.

This appointment comes after the retirement of long-term employee Tony Laughter.

Dale Pennell, who resides in the Weaverville area, has 40 years of engineering experience in western North Carolina, including civil engineering design and construction, pavement, sidewalks, greenways, erosion control measures, storm water management, water and sewer lines, parks, and commercial and institutional facilities. Over the years, he has worked for Lyda Associates and McGill Associates, both in the private sector and for the City of Asheville for some seven years. Pennell will begin in his official capacity as the Town of Weaverville Public Works Director on January 2, 2018.

2017 Annual Christmas Parade Review

The annual Christmas Parade was held on its regularly scheduled date, the first Saturday of December, the 2nd. The weather really cooperated this year with temperatures hovering in the 50s with scattered clouds. One of the largest crowds I can remember in the 28 years working on the parade. A lot of work goes into a parade, beginning in October when the telephone committee starts calling prospective float entries. The Town Manager, along with the Police Chief and Fire Chief, begin assessing street dosures, the parade route and lineup procedures. Then, all entries are put on a computer for line-up. A Grand Marshal and float judges are chosen. Posters have to be made and advertising completed. Santa's sleigh has to be deaned and decorated. Santa's candy has to be purchased. The telephone committee calls each entry in order to get mailing and calling data, as well

The Grand Marshal for Weaverville's 2017 Christmas Parade was Reverend Jim McCoy, retired pastor of the First Baptist Church of Weaverville. Reverent McCoy and his family have resided on Church Street for many years. as entry information. Then, a letter is mailed to all participants with line-up numbers and necessary parade information. After meeting with Fire Chief Ted Williams, Police Chief Greg Stephens and Town Manager Selena Coffey, location and spaces must be decided and marked for all entries. For the past 13 years the parade line-up has been at North Buncombe Middle School. Because there are so many entries, the North Buncombe High School Marching Band moves to Tractor Supply Company.

Again this year, we decided to have a PA system set up to announce all entries as they came down Main Street. The system was set up at Rodney's Auto Service by Stewart Sound. Local Main Street merchant, Rob Mangum, was our announcer this year.

The morning of the parade, Weaverville Firefighters, Weaverville Police Officers, volunteers and myself are stationed early at the command post to see that all entries have their line-up numbers and are directed to their proper spaces. Both the Police and Fire Departments, help me with the line-up and overseeing traffic control.

When the parade, which this year lasted one hour and fifteen minutes, is over, the Public Works Department's hard work really begins, so as to get up all the thrown candy and trash off the streets before dusk. Finally, Santa's sleigh has to be deaned and put in storage for the next year.

This year, 100 entries were in the parade. The streets were lined with people from the corner of Dula Springs Road down North and South Main Streets to witness the Town Parade and everyone waiting on the arrival of Santa Claus and lots of candy! Friends told me they had never seen so much enthusiasm with both the crowd and the participants. After all, it's all about the children!

Right as the parade began, a wheel on the float carrying children from Richland Baptist Church broke, thus leaving the award winning float unable to participate. Children as well as adults were left crying standing beside their broken float, still located within the gates of the middle school. Covenant Church spotted the disappointed group, then stopped and invited them to jump on their float and ride in the parade. How happy they were to be in the parade. To me, that is what Christmas is about.
